



Equine Entry Requirements

California requires a **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI)**, issued within 30 days before entry, and evidence of a negative **Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) test** performed at a United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) -approved laboratory within 12 months before the date of entry. These requirements apply to horses, ponies, mules, donkeys, burros, and zebras. ([FAC 9641.5](#)). California also accepts the six-month extended Equine Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (eECVI) in lieu of the standard 30-day CVI.



Official Methods of Equine Identification Include:

- A description to identify the individual equine including, but not limited to, name, age, breed, color, gender, distinctive markings, **and** unique permanent forms of identification (e.g. brands, tattoos, scars, cowlicks, blemishes, or iris scans),
- Digital photographs sufficient to identify the individual equine (pictures of both sides, front, and back), and/or
- Microchips:
 - * USDA-compliant 134.2 kHz microchips, or
 - * All 125 kHz and 128 kHz microchips implanted prior to March 2014.

Note: If you have horses used for livestock husbandry or for other ranch-related activities, please call the California Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) **Animal Health Branch (AHB) permit line at (916) 900-5052** to inquire about a Working Horse Permit.

Note:

- An EIA test "pending" result does not meet the entry requirement.
- The CVI must list the date of the EIA test, name of laboratory that performed the test, laboratory accession number, and the test result.

EIA Test Exemption

Nursing foals less than 6 months of age being moved with an EIA test negative dam.
