

California Department of Food and Agriculture **Important Notice to Inedible Kitchen Grease (IKG) Transporters**



Unauthorized Container Removal is Prohibited!



Under Food and Agricultural Code §19313.5, it is illegal for any person to:

"Steal, misappropriate, contaminate, or damage inedible kitchen grease, or containers thereof."

This includes the unauthorized removal of IKG containers placed by another licensed transporter.

Unauthorized removal of a container may result in civil penalties of up to \$5,000 and/ or criminal charges (FAC 19447).

CONTAINER REMOVAL PERMITTED ONLY IF LEGALLY ABANDONED

IKG containers may only be removed if they are lawfully considered abandoned by the restaurant or generator.

Pursuant to California Civil Code §1993, commercial property (such as IKG containers) is not considered abandoned unless the restaurant has:

- Terminated service with the original transporter
- Provided written notice of abandonment
- Followed the required legal process for commercial property abandonment

A transporter may only remove a container if:

They have express authorization from the restaurant, and The container is determined to be abandoned in accordance with Civil Code section 1993

Any removal facilitated by the customer/restaurant must be addressed directly with the restaurant. CDFA does not oversee or arbitrate container abandonment or removal agreements between businesses.

WHAT THIS MEANS FOR YOU

Do NOT remove a competitor's container unless:

You are authorized by the restaurant

The container has been properly abandoned under applicable law
