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TRACK 1: THE CALIFORNIA FARM TO SCHOOL K-12 PROCUREMENT AND EDUCATION GRANT

Academia Avance \$150,000.00

Los Angeles County

Academia Avance will support students and families to develop lifelong dietary habits and decrease the prevalence of obesity through nutrition education and cooking classes. Academia Avance will increase the quantity and variety of fresh fruits and vegetables that it offers to students through the school meal program.

Alhambra Unified School District

\$162,780.00

Los Angeles County

Alhambra Unified School District will partner with current food vendors to procure locally grown fruits and vegetables to incorporate into school meals. Harvest of the Month teachers will receive local produce for classroom activities and sampling. Student-led Nutrition Advisory Councils will promote healthy eating incorporating locally grown produce at schools.

Alta Public Schools \$149,972.00

Los Angeles County

Alta Public Schools will lead change in a community with food insecurity and lack of food access. Alta Public Schools will provide parents and students with high quality nutrition education and significantly increase the amount and variety of fresh fruits and vegetables in meal programs.

Alum Rock Union Elementary School District

\$145,950.00

Santa Clara County

Alum Rock Union Elementary School District will collaborate with schools, community organizations, and local farmers to establish sustainable school gardens, integrate locally sourced whole foods into program menus, develop an environmental project-based curriculum that focuses on sustainable food systems, and provide nutrition education activities that engage students and parents.

Antioch Unified School District

\$171,670.00

Contra Costa County

Antioch Unified School District will implement the Cultivating Minds with Farm Fresh Finds Project throughout the district's 24 schools. Students will have opportunities to taste locally grown produce and learn about produce with a nutrition education component. Food demonstrations, recipes, and information flyers will be part of this initiative.

Elk Grove Unified School District

\$644,800.00

Sacramento County

Elk Grove Unified School District will develop relationships to purchase products directly from area farms and have farm product processed locally for fresh and/or frozen use in meals that it

serves district-wide. Florin High School region Ag Tech and Culinary Academies will serve as hubs for school-grown produce, recipe development, and nutrition/agriculture education.

Esparto Unified School District

\$150,000.00

Yolo County

Esparto Unified School District will procure California-grown produce to incorporate into school meal recipes. Esparto Unified will expand farm to community efforts by reviving and constructing indoor and outdoor learning spaces; developing or modifying curriculum at all schools; and educating students about the produce, nutrition, and health.

Fallbrook Union High School District

\$29,106.00

San Diego County

Fallbrook Union High School District will increase student access to locally grown produce and educate students on the importance of its consumption from an environmental, fiscal, and nutritional perspective. The district will go beyond the classroom to provide farm visits, taste tests, hands-on recipe development, and a variety of educational resources for its students.

FIELD/EPIC de Cesar Chavez High School

\$150,000.00

Kern County

EPIC de Cesar Chavez High School will provide fresh fruits and vegetables to students who are mainly farmworkers who grow the food but cannot afford to eat the produce they grow due to the high cost. EPIC de Cesar Chavez High School will also provide education and training on fresh food production and healthy foods.

Fresno Unified School District

Fresno County

Fresno Unified School District will establish a Farm to School Coordinator to work with schools to create educational opportunities for students; work with procurement to increase vendors that practice climate smart agriculture; increase the nutrition educational opportunities at schools; and collaborate with the Fresno Unified Wellness Manager to increase outreach to the Fresno community.

Gravenstein Union School District

\$143,880.00

Sonoma County

Gravenstein Union School District will expand its current program by purchasing supplies for existing school gardens; building a new school garden with a compost area, water catchment, and outdoor classroom space with wheelchair accessibility; and hosting volunteer workdays to build community. Students may participate in a garden club and trimester garden elective.

Hueneme School District

\$150,000.00

Ventura County

Hueneme School District will increase its farm to school program impact by hiring a Program Coordinator to connect garden-based nutrition curriculum to local foods that the district serves in school meals and sources from the Ventura County School Food Hub.

Jurupa Unified School District

\$190,890.00

Riverside County

Jurupa Unified School District will implement California Thursdays; hire a Farm to School Coordinator to educate students and plan farm-related activities; re-vitalize school gardens; purchase small composters for the existing school gardens; and educate students, teachers, and staff about composting and the need to separate food scraps from other trash.

Laurel Tree Charter School

\$142,050.00

Humboldt County

Laurel Tree Charter School will have dependable transportation and a secure mobile kitchen classroom. This will enable hands-on learning for Laurel Tree's TK-12 Edible Education program between its two campuses and its outdoor learning venues. It will protect Laurel Tree's materials from theft and provide the opportunity for teaching edible education classes and coordinating farm visits.

Lodi Unified School District

\$314,000,00

San Joaquin County

Lodi Unified School District will expand its farm to school efforts by implementing an Edible Nutrition Education Program. Experiential learning opportunities across all grade levels will connect students to where food comes from, how it grows, how it tastes, and how to eat healthy with school meals and at home.

Long Beach Unified School District

\$720,020.00

Los Angeles County

Long Beach Unified School District's Farm to School project will build upon 20+ years of experience to increase access to and consumption of locally grown fruits and vegetables by sourcing locally grown, culturally relevant foods; supporting school garden programs; and increasing nutrition education opportunities in its schools, gardens, and community.

Los Angeles Leadership Academy

Los Angeles County

Los Angeles Leadership Academy (LALA) will expand its existing farm to school project. This project will strengthen connections between LALA's operating school farm and its school food service program by installing a salad bar and sourcing school menu items from the farm.

Los Angeles Unified School District

Los Angeles County

Los Angeles Unified School District – in partnership with Alice Waters Institute, Benjamin Thomas, and Common Threads – will implement a multi-year Farm to School Initiative to transform the district's procurement practices for California products, enhance the variety and frequency of fresh California produce that the district offers, and provide farm to school educational activities for all students.

Modoc Joint Unified School District

Modoc County

Modoc Joint Unified School District will implement a farm to school culinary education program that focuses on student engagement with growing, harvesting, and processing locally grown produce and serving it in the school meal program. This will require a new greenhouse, kitchen upgrades, teaching support, and collaboration with local growers.

Montague Charter Academy

Los Angeles County

Montague Charter Academy will help decrease the prevalence of obesity among children and parents through the implementation of a comprehensive nutrition curriculum, a school garden, and a salad bar. Students at Montague will increase the amount and variety of fruits and vegetables consumed during school meals.

Mt. Diablo Unified School District

Contra Costa County

Mt. Diablo Unified School District (MDUSD) will improve infrastructure and access for ultra-local farm field trips to the 2-acre Riverview Middle School Garden. A dedicated farmer will help schools increase on-site food production and MDUSD will commence procurement with three ultra-local farms for school salad bars. MDUSD will build program sustainability via community relationship-building.

Napa Valley Unified School District

Napa County

Napa Valley Unified School District (NVUSD) will redesign and update gardens at nine schools. NVUSD will invest in school garden materials, fencing, tools, wash stations, and garden-based nutrition lessons supporting Next Generation Science Standards. NVUSD will utilize school garden-grown produce in school meals and Harvest of the Month taste testing.

Oakland Unified School District

Alameda County

Oakland Unified School District will integrate expanded Harvest of the Month programming in alignment with groundbreaking work of The Center – increasing food security, local sourcing, and the long-term healthy habits for all of Oakland's students and their families. Ultimately, the district will help improve students' long-term health and life outcomes across Oakland.

Oxnard School District

\$157,300.00

Ventura County

Oxnard School District (OSD) will contract a Farm to School Coordinator who will collaborate with Child Nutrition, Educational Services, the OSD Grounds Manager, and the OSD Wellness Collaborative. The contractor will implement programs to improve health and wellness among students, teachers, staff, and families through educational opportunities, garden education, and connecting locally grown produce to benefit nutrition and sustainability practices.

Oxnard Union High School District

Ventura County

Oxnard Union High School District will focus efforts on making meaningful and lasting relationships with local farmers to procure local and seasonal produce and will educate students on the importance and health benefits of eating locally sourced produce through cooking events, field trips, and nutrition lessons.

Palm Springs Unified School District

\$168,259.00

Riverside County

Palm Springs Unified School District will continue to strengthen contractual relationships built with local farmers by bringing them to four secondary campuses to cultivate and refurbish school gardens, implement farmers markets at four additional elementary sites, and expand nutrition education through digital menu boards at all school sites.

Parlier Unified School District

\$150,000.00

Fresno County

Parlier Unified School District will build pastures and plant trees at the newly reopened school farm to allow students to raise livestock and grow fruit for sale to school cafeterias and the community. Ag students will oversee planting, maintenance, and harvesting and will also help promote healthy produce in the cafeterias.

Pasadena Unified School District

\$174,017.00

Los Angeles County

Pasadena Unified School District will increase access to fresh, nutritious, and healthy food in school meals and will increase equity in educational activities that engage all students in farm to school experiences from pre-school through high school.

Porterville Unified School District

\$150,000.00

Tulare County

Porterville Unified School District will procure California-grown produce to incorporate into a pilot Harvest of the Month program at five school campuses throughout the district. This project integrates educational activities that connect a climate- and agriculture-focused, work-based learning program for high school students with educational opportunities for K–12 students.

Reeds Creek Elementary School District

Tehama County

Reeds Creek Elementary School District will address food independence and nutrition needs in western Tehama County. This project will expand an existing school garden and greenhouse to meet the following goals: foster food independence, minimize and utilize food waste, vertically integrate garden opportunities with K-8 curriculum, and provide community outreach.

Rialto Unified School District

San Bernardino County

Rialto Unified School District will expand existing local procurement practices at Rialto Middle

School by educating students about environmental resiliency. Rialto Middle School strives to grow educational and enrichment opportunities through community partnerships and the creation of curriculum. It is the school's goal to feed its students nutritious, fresh produce in their daily lunches.

Rio School District \$150,000.00

Ventura County

Rio School District will build a district-wide farm to school program serving 5,300 K-8 students across nine schools. Child Nutrition Services will increase procurement of Ventura Countygrown fruits and vegetables by 300%, implement school garden and nutrition education at six additional schools, and renovate or build four school gardens.

Riverside Unified School District

Riverside County

Riverside Unified School District will start up its "Farmers Market" salad bars, which have been on hiatus since the start of the pandemic, at all 30 of its elementary schools. Funding will support a staff person to source local produce from BIPOC farmers who utilize climate smart growing practices and are Good Agricultural Practices (GAP) certified.

Sacramento City Unified School District

Sacramento County

Sacramento City Unified School District (SCUSD) will partner with Soil Born Farms to forward-plant specific produce for SCUSD salad bars. Soil Born Farms will build upon existing operations and build infrastructure to extend growing seasons to supply lettuces and other culturally diverse crops for SCUSD to process in-house and distribute to SCUSD school sites.

San Diego County Office of Education

\$150,000.00

San Diego County

San Diego County Office of Education will serve the most vulnerable student population in San Diego County through the Come to the Table: Cultivating Change and Healing program, empowering each school site with the materials and technical assistance needed to gain understanding of food sources, cultivation, nutrition, historical food traditions, composting, and environmental stewardship.

San Diego Unified School District

\$1,000,000.00

San Diego County

San Diego Unified School District will expand farm to school programming, including increased spending on California-grown tree fruit and local crops as well as robust food literacy marketing and education efforts. Program staff and nonprofit partners will facilitate and deliver food literacy presentations, STEAM and garden-based lessons, field trips, cafeteria and classroom tastings, and community events.

San Jacinto Unified School District

\$101,420.00

Riverside County

San Jacinto Unified School District will enrich its students with fresh, healthy produce and food that it procures from neighborhood farms. Local farmers will visit the elementary schools; provide a "farmers market" atmosphere with fresh produce samples, including seasonal fruits and vegetables; educate students on benefits of procuring from local farms; and provide "farm life" bus tour opportunities.

San Luis Coastal Unified School District

San Luis Obispo County

San Luis Coastal Unified School District will intentionally connect elementary classroom curricula with its school meal program and gardens, growing opportunities for students to engage in hands-on, edible education experiences. Students will be immersed in their food system, learning about how food gets to their plates and tasting it in the school lunchroom.

San Miguel Joint Union School District

San Luis Obispo County

San Miguel Joint Union School District will expand its "wheat2school" program through garden education and cooking classes. The district will partner with a community bakery that sources local grain to procure 100% whole wheat bread and pizza dough for student meals. The district will expand local procurement of fruits, vegetables, and meats to create a hyper local plate.

Santa Ana Unified School District

\$501,240.00

Orange County

Santa Ana Unified School District will procure and deliver local, fresh produce for students, including tasty, culturally relevant foods. Career Technical Education (CTE), Expanded Learning staff, and Nutrition Services' Registered Dietitians will co-develop educational activities with high school students to be disseminated district-wide. Nutrition Services and Family and Community Engagement staff will provide community outreach.

Santa Cruz City Schools

Santa Cruz County

Santa Cruz City Schools' food services team will bridge the gap between farm to school initiatives in the district and its goal plant-to-plate effort. The team will feature a local Harvest of the Month, establish local procurement partners, and build student engagement with educational tools that encourage student participation in food-based education.

Shandon Joint Unified School District

San Luis Obispo County

Shandon Joint Unified School District will expand its "wheat2school" program through garden education and cooking classes. The district will partner with a community bakery that sources local grain to procure 100% whole wheat bread and pizza dough for student meals. The district will expand local procurement of fruits, vegetables, and meats to create a hyper local plate.

Shoreline Unified School District

\$150,000.00

Marin County

Shoreline Unified School District will develop and implement a comprehensive Farm to School Program to improve food education and serve healthier, California-grown meals to its students. The district will begin with its "Better Burrito" program and grow from there. Educational field trips, events, and producer school visits will provide learning engagement.

Sierra-Plumas Joint Unified School District

Sierra County

Sierra-Plumas Joint Unified School District will make improvements to its current learning garden spaces to make available student-grown, farm to school learning opportunities year-round. These improvements will include updating greenhouses and outdoor learning structures to creating more functional garden spaces by extending boundaries and installing storage facilities.

South Monterey County Joint Union High School District

Monterey County

South Monterey County Joint Union High School District will establish two farm to school programs by partnering with the California Wheat Commission (CWC) to procure whole grain wheat from California farmers, use a mill for baked goods, and use an extruder to add fresh pasta into school meals. The district will also procure local grass-fed beef for school meals.

Surprise Valley Joint Unified School District

Modoc County

Surprise Valley Joint Unified School District will install a hoop house, re-establish a fruit orchard, and provide hands-on learning opportunities for K-12 students. The district will source student-grown and other locally grown produce for school lunches. The district will work with local partners to host an "Agxplore the Valley" annual farm to fork field trip.

Sweetwater Union High School District

\$385,530.00

San Diego County

Sweetwater Union High School District (SUHSD) will expand its current pilot farm project, support garden projects and nutrition education at 11 schools, and develop a master garden program. SUHSD will also partner with South Bay Sustainable Communities to expand the district's food rescue and composting program to all 23 school sites.

Tahoe Truckee Unified School District

Placer County

Tahoe Truckee Unified School District will expand its partnership with the Tahoe Food Hub (TFH) to implement a climate smart farm to school program. The project will align local food for school meals with educational opportunities that focus on the important role that regenerative agricultural and locally grown foods have on the environment.

Upland Unified School District (UUSD) will strengthen the district's farm to school impact to ensure that every student has access to farm to school education and garden-fresh produce. UUSD will hire two garden educators and three FoodCorps service members. UUSD will also expand partnerships with local farmers and produce hubs through increased procurement and educational outreach.

Vacaville Unified School District

Vacaville Unified School District will expand scratch-cooking efforts by procuring locally grown produce through local vendors for all schools. Padan Elementary School will implement a Harvest of the Month Program and update to a scratch kitchen with new equipment: food prep sink, outside walk-in refrigerator, and combi oven.

West Contra Costa Unified School District

West Contra Costa Unified School District will build upon its transition to fresh, local, organic, scratch-cooked meals and will further increase meal participation by more deeply engaging students and cultivating a love of fresh food. Through local procurement, garden-based education, and student ambassadors, the district will strengthen its food services culture.

Western Placer Unified School District

Western Placer Unified School District will hire a Culinary Coordinator to focus on training its food service team to execute meals made with locally procured ingredients and facilitate culinary education for students. The district will hire a marketing agency to highlight its farm to school efforts to students and families in a meaningful way.

Yucaipa-Calimesa Joint Unified School District will expand its local farm to school initiatives by implementing educational opportunities that will include highlighting Next Generation Science Standard Local Farm Field trips as well as increasing locally grown seasonal fruits and vegetables in the school meal program.
