# **Grant Purpose**

The California Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) 2023-24 California Farm to School Incubator Grant Program will award competitive grants to support projects that cultivate equity, nurture students, build climate resilience, and create scalable and sustainable change.







## **Grant Priorities**

## **Funding Priorities:**

- Engage students from underserved communities
- Include small to midsize California food producers
- Include veteran California food producers, socially disadvantaged California food producers, and/or limited-resource farm households in CA
- ❖ Include California food producers who utilize climate smart agriculture practices, climate smart agriculture production systems like certified organic or transitioning to certified organic; other regenerative strategies that increase resilience to climate change, improve the health of communities and soil, protect water and air quality, increase biodiversity, and help store carbon in the soil; or sustainable pest management.

### **Additional Priorities:**

- Aim to distribute awards geographically across California to the extent possible
- Set aside up to 10% of all available grant funding for awards for Tribal governments and Tribal-based non-profit organizations

# Track 1: F2S TK-12 Procurement & Education Grant (overview)

Track 1 will fund <u>individual public school districts</u>, <u>county offices of education</u>, <u>charter schools</u>, <u>and Tribal schools in California that are a School Food Authority</u> to establish new or expand existing farm to school programs that:

- Procure California grown or produced, whole or minimally processed foods for incorporation into school meals, especially from food producers that utilize climate smart agriculture practices, small to midsize food producers, veteran food producers, socially disadvantaged food producers, and/or limited-resource farm households in California; and
- engage students in <u>hands-on food education opportunities</u>, especially standards-aligned and culturally relevant opportunities led by credentialed or certificated educators, that complement the school meal program's California food procurement efforts; and
- ❖ OPTIONAL: if desired, employ farm to school staff and/or offer farm to school professional development for staff.







# Track 1: F2S TK-12 Procurement & Education Grant (eligibility)

Public school districts

OR

County offices of ed.

OR

**Charter** schools

OR

Tribal schools

...that are a School Food Authority (SFA) in California currently operating the National School Lunch Program (NSLP).







# Track 1: F2S TK-12 Procurement & Education Grant (details)

Grant Term: Up to 2 years; exact dates to be released in final RFA

**Funding Formula** = \$15 per student enrolled (SY 2022-23) \$200k min and \$1.5M max

**Allowable Costs:** anything you need to buy more whole or minimally processed CA Grown foods + educate students about them:

- CA Grown food for school meals & hands-on food education
- Infrastructure/equipment/supplies for hands-on food education & school kitchens
- F2S staff (e.g., coordinators, educators)

- Labor for procuring/processing
- Travel
- Contractors
- Indirect

## Reporting:

- ❖ Beginning interview, Pre-survey, and Final interview
- Regular financial reporting: track CA Grown purchases & other spending
- Quarterly check-in surveys (what's working, how can we help, procurement practices, education impacts, etc.)

# Track 1: 2022 Project Example

Grantee: Yucaipa-Calimesa Joint Unified School District (13 schools)

Award Amount: \$150k (in 2023-24, would be eligible for \$200k)

## **Project Activities:**

- Providing hands-on local farm field trips that incorporate Next Generation Science Standards
- Increasing procurement of seasonal fruits and vegetables from local farms for school meals, including from the farm providing the field trips









# Track 2: F2S Technical Assistance (TA) Grant (overview)

Track 2 will fund <u>farm to school technical assistance organizations</u> to help California School Food Authorities (SFAs) and California food producers implement resilient and sustainable farm to school programming. TA projects must:

- build <u>school nutrition</u>, <u>educator</u>, <u>or producer capacity</u> to implement farm to school programs; **and**
- focus technical assistance in one of the following categories:
  - School Food: helping California SFAs implement farm to school procurement programs
  - <u>Education</u>: helping California SFAs implement hands-on food education programs in TK-12 settings, especially programs that are standards-aligned, culturally relevant, incorporate credentialed or certificated educators, and complement the school meal program
  - <u>Producer Training</u>: helping California food producers sell products to California SFAs







# Track 2: F2S Technical Assistance (TA) Grant (eligibility)

## F2S Technical Assistance Organizations

**<u>Definition</u>**: Any of the following orgs that (a) have an <u>established history</u> supporting California SFAs or California educators with implementing farm to school initiatives or (b) have an <u>established history</u> supporting California food producers and institutional food procurement:

- Non-profit organizations, including agricultural industry non-profit organizations
- Tribal-based non-profit organizations
- Resource Conservation Districts in CA
- UC ANR and UC Cooperative Extension county offices
- Public universities in CA
- California Native American Tribes
- County agencies and local governments in CA
- Projects with a non-profit fiscal sponsor

**NOTE:** Food hubs are <u>not</u> eligible. See Track 4 instead.

<u>Required Partners</u>: School Food and Education projects must partner with at least one California SFA. Producer Training projects must partner with at least one California SFA <u>and</u> at least one California food producer.







# Track 2: F2S Technical Assistance (TA) Grant (details)

Grant Term: Up to 2 years; exact dates to be released in final RFA

Award Amounts: \$50k to \$500k

**Allowable Costs:** anything you need to build school nutrition, educator, or producer capacity to implement farm to school programs:

- CA Grown food for hands-on food education
- NOT ALLOWED: Food procurement for school meals. That's what Track 1 is for.
- Infrastructure/equipment/supplies

- F2S staff
- Travel
- Contractors
- Indirect

## Reporting:

- ❖ Beginning interview, Pre-survey, and Final interview
- Regular financial reporting: track all spending
- Quarterly check-in surveys (what's working, how can we help, collaboration strategies, project impacts, etc.)

# Track 3: Farm to ECE Grant (overview)

Track 3 will fund <u>child care centers in California and farm to ECE technical assistance</u> <u>organizations</u> to establish new or expand existing farm to ECE programs that:

- procure <u>California grown or produced</u>, whole or <u>minimally processed</u> foods for incorporation into meals/snacks and/or food boxes for young children, especially from food producers that utilize climate smart agriculture practices, small to midsize food producers, veteran food producers, socially disadvantaged food producers, and/or limited-resource farm households in California; and
- engage young children in <u>hands-on food education opportunities</u>, especially standards-aligned and culturally relevant opportunities led by educators with a Child Development Teacher Permit, that complement the meal program's and/or food box program's California food procurement efforts; and
- ❖ OPTIONAL: if desired, employ farm to ECE staff and/or offer farm to ECE professional development for staff.







# Track 3: Farm to ECE Grant (eligibility)

# Farm to ECE Technical Assistance Orgs

OR

**<u>Definition</u>**: Any of the following orgs that provide support to ECE providers in CA:

CACFP sponsors, Child Care and Development Fund Tribal Lead Agencies in CA, Child Care Resource and Referral Agencies in CA, First 5 county commissions in CA, Head Start grantees in CA, nonprofit orgs, Tribal-based non-profit organizations, Resource Conservation Districts in CA, UC ANR and UC Cooperative Extension county offices, public universities in CA, California Native American Tribes, county agencies in CA, local governments in CA, projects with a non-profit fiscal sponsor

**Required Partners:** at least two ECE sites in CA

## **Child Care Centers**

#### **Definition**:

- Located in CA
- Provide care all or part of the day
- Single-site or multi-site
- Primarily serve young children birth through age 5
- Licensed by the CDSS Community Care Licensing Division OR meet appropriate criteria for a license exemption







# Track 3: Farm to ECE Grant (details)

**Grant Term:** Up to 2 years; exact dates to be released in final RFA

Award Amounts: \$50k to \$200k

Allowable Costs: anything you need to establish or expand farm to ECE programs:

- CA Grown food for meals/snacks/food boxes & hands-on food education \* Labor for procuring/processing
- Infrastructure/equipment/supplies for hands-on food education & FCF kitchens
- F2ECE staff (e.g., coordinators, educators)

## Reporting:

- ❖ Beginning interview, Pre-survey, and Final interview
- Regular financial reporting: track CA Grown purchases & other spending
- Quarterly check-ins (what's working, how can we help, procurement practices, education impacts, etc.)

- Travel
- Contractors, Mini grants
- Indirect

# Track 3: 2022 Project Example

Grantee: McCarthy Family Child Development & Training Center

Award Amount: \$200k



## **Project Activities:**

- Procuring locally grown produce for children's meals
- Providing food boxes with locally grown foods to families
- Implementing seasonal food taste tests for children
- Collaborating with a composting organization to plan/implement a composting system for the center and include education for staff/children/families
- Implementing a food-based curriculum for children including planting, growing, harvesting







# Track 4: F2S Producer Grant (overview)

Track 4 will fund <u>California food producers and public-serving food aggregation and distribution enterprises</u> to increase production, processing, and/or distribution capacity to sell California grown or produced, whole or minimally processed foods to the school food market.

Funding will prioritize small to midsize food producers; veteran, socially disadvantaged, and/or limited-resource food producers; and food producers utilizing climate smart agriculture practices or production systems.







# Track 4: F2S Producer Grant (eligibility)

## **CA** food producers

OR

**Definition:** A person, group of individuals, non-profit organization, or California Native American Tribe that leases, rents, or owns land in California (whether the land is publicly owned, privately owned, or Tribal land) and cultivates crops, raises livestock, and/or uses Indigenous food production practices on this land, **and/or** a California seafood harvester.

# Public-serving food aggregation & distribution enterprises

**Definition:** Often called a "food hub," this entity serves as a supply chain intermediary for local or regional farms or ranches, particularly those optimizing climate smart agriculture production practices or methods and following state labor practices. An eligible enterprise must prioritize to the greatest extent possible, but is not limited to, serving farms or ranches that are 500 acres or less; cooperatively owned; or owned by farmers who are socially disadvantaged, beginning, limited resource, veterans, or disabled. Additionally, an eligible enterprise must handle 100% CA grown products within CA or be able to farm identify sourcing for 100% of products to ensure

state dollars support CA farms and ranches.







# Track 4: F2S Producer Grant (eligibility clarification)

In this grant program, the term "food producer" does **not** include school-operated gardens and school-operated farms.

## What this means:

- School-operated gardens and school-operated farms are <u>not</u> eligible to apply to Track 4.
- School-operated gardens and school-operated farms <u>may be an element</u> of a **Track 1** project (i.e., for hands-on food education activities or as a food source for CA grown food procurement). However, they would <u>not</u> qualify as a food producer partner in Track 1, 2, or 3.
- \* <u>Third parties</u> (such as individual contractors or non-profit organizations) that operate a farm on school property (rather than the school operating it) are eligible to apply to Track 4 as a CA food producer. They are also eligible food producer partners in Track 1, 2, and 3.







# Track 4: F2S Producer Grant (eligibility continued)

## **Applicants must:**

## 1) Identify the school(s) you plan to work with:

- at least one CA public school district, county office of ed., charter school, or Tribal school that is a School Food Authority (SFA) currently operating the National School Lunch Program (NSLP); and/or
- at least one California child care center currently participating in the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP)

### 2) Provide evidence of collaboration:

A letter of intent from the director of the school meal program at each School Food Authority or Child Care Center that the applicant identifies as a project partner







# Track 4: F2S Producer Grant (details)

Grant Term: Up to 2 years; exact dates to be released in final RFA

Award Amounts: \$15k to \$250k

**Allowable Costs:** anything you need to increase capacity to sell CA Grown food to schools and, if desired, to provide hands-on food education to schools:

- Equipment/infrastructure/supplies to: increase production/processing/distribution capacity to sell food to schools, establish/enhance use of climate smart ag practices for school food, establish/expand hands-on food education opportunities for students or school staff (e.g., farm field trips) that complement food sales
- Staffing costs dedicated to farm to school work
- Certifications, licensures, or insurance needed to sell food to schools (e.g., food safety)
- Travel, Contractors, Indirect

## Reporting:

- ❖ Beginning interview, Pre-survey, and Final interview
- Regular financial reporting: track all spending
- Quarterly check-in surveys (what's working, how can we help, food sales to schools, use of climate smart ag practices, etc.)

Apps from (or that include) CA producers who utilize climate smart agriculture practices / production systems





# Track 4: 2022 Project Example

**Grantee:** McGrath Family Farmers Inc.

Award Amount: \$150k (in 2023-24, would be eligible for up to \$250k)

## **Project Activities:**

- Purchasing infrastructure and equipment to scale up farm to school production
- Growing crops, conserving water, composting, and planting hedgerows
- Partnering with local school districts
