



The Dairy Plus Program is administered by the Office of Environmental Farming & Innovation, a division of the California Department of Food

## What is the Dairy Plus program?

This program awards competitive grants to California dairy farms for the implementation of advanced manure management practices that reduce both methane emissions and nutrient surplus. Dairy PLUS will provide incentives for dairy producers to adopt advanced manure management practices, reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) and improve nutrient benefits associated with implemented practices.

## What is the history of the program?

The California Dairy Research Foundation (CDRF), in collaboration with CDFA and several other organizations, was awarded \$85 million in funding by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) under the Partnerships for Climate-Smart Commodities program in 2022. CDRF allocated \$75M to CDFA to provide financial incentives for California dairy farmers to adopt advanced manure management practices to reduce both methane emissions and nitrogen surplus.

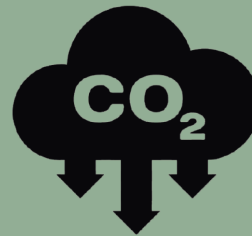
## How many projects have been funded?

Since the program's 2023 inception, 12 projects have been awarded associated to AMMP and 3 projects associated to DDRDP.

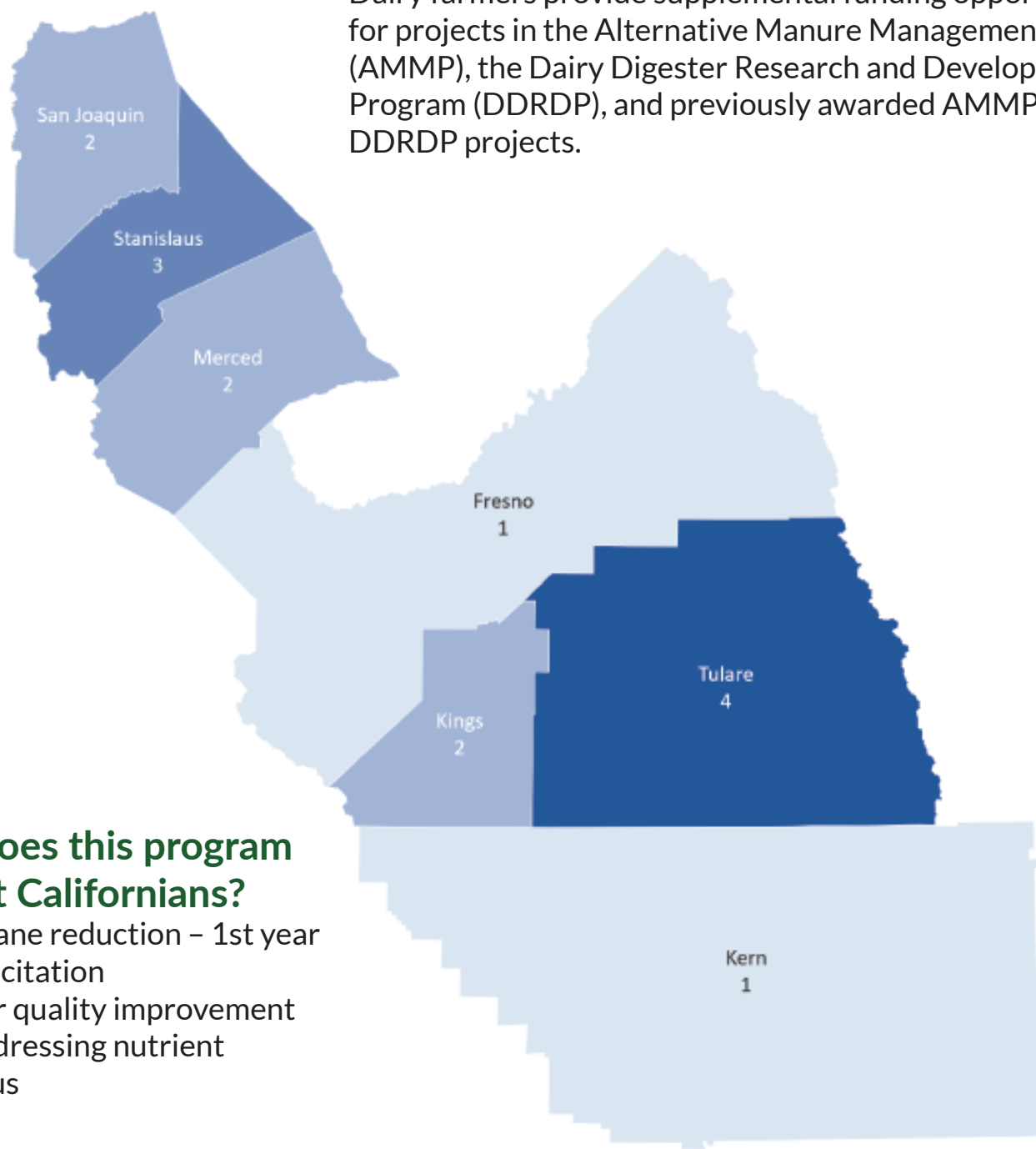
