Food & Agricultural Code The Law

The California Food and Agricultural Code Section 29044(a):

"...person in possession of any apiary, shall pay...an annual registration fee not to exceed two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) to the secretary on January 1 of each year..."





Food & Agricultural Code The Exemption

The California Food and Agricultural Code Section 29044(a) also includes an exemption clause:

".....The **board of supervisors of any county**, with the approval of the secretary, may **waive** the registration fee for any beekeeper, apiary owner, apiary operator, or person, who is a hobbyist not in the business of beekeeping and who possesses nine or fewer colonies."





Registration Fee Schedule

This section FAC 29044 establishes the following annual registration fee schedule for any person in possession of an apiary. Each beekeeper **shall** pay an annual registration fee.

*Fee amount cannot be zero, however beekeepers with nine colonies or less may request a fee waiver.

Note: Fees for beekeepers are delayed until January 1, 2025, but registration with the county agricultural commissioner is still required.






Survey Results...



Are you a hobbyist beekeeper?



159 survey takers.


8 responded as "No", not a hobbyist

151 responded as "Yes", a hobbyist

Of the respondents that entered "No", two answered that they were a commercial beekeeper.

How many hives do you have?






How many hives do you have?

*One hobbyist reported 60 hives and another 120 hives!












Do you plan to register your bees?





- •Bee diagnostics/testing upon request or fee based. Accessible and affordable.
- •Funding for non-profits that promote education on honeybees.
- •Hive testing when requested; similar to the diagnostic labs across CA.
- •Information on procedures required to vacate bees from properties.
- Pesticide use reduction in cities and counties and well as restriction for residential use.
- Real-time spray notification alerts.



Additional services you would be interested in (Continued)



- •Regulating commercial (migratory) out-of-state beekeepers and where they "park" their flatbeds laden with hundreds of hives.
- Seasonal checklist for both Northern and Southern California and areas in between.
- •Would like to see diagnostic labs established where beekeeper can bring their bees for tests and diagnostics; like Avian Science labs operate under CDFA.
- Varroa research information.

County Agricultural Commissioner Update

Apiary Inspection Program

- A program that emphasizes the registration and site location of honeybee colonies in the county.
- At the request of beekeepers or growers, the CAC inspects colonies for strength and health to ensure effective pollination.
- •Enforcement of local county ordinances and the Food and Agriculture Code, Division 13, Bee Management & Honey Production





Ag Commissioner Survey – Hobbyist Apiary Reg.

- •Hobbyist Defined as: Food & Ag Code 29044, possess 9 or fewer colonies
- 45 counties responded to survey
- 13 of these counties <u>HAVE NOT historically waived</u> the \$10 fee and do not plan on changing their polices with the adoption of the new regulation
- 26 counties that responded <u>HAVE historically waived</u> the fee, plan to continue to waive the fee.
- 6 are considering no longer waiving the fee and change their policies with the adoption of the new regulation.
- Counties offering fee waivers will do so for all qualifying beekeepers, as determined by their Board of Supervisor approved Fee Schedule.

- After comments are considered, final regulation is published and becomes effective.




FAQ'S
