Farmers' Rice Cooperative

\$3,000,000.00 Expanding Needed Middle-of-the-Supply-Chain Processing for Value-**Added California Rice Products**

Farmers' Rice Cooperative will establish an agreement with the California Department of Food and Agriculture to purchase rice extrusion and value-added processing equipment for its facility in Sacramento. With this purchase, Farmers' Rice Cooperative and its growers will be able to process and repurpose damaged rice into value-added products such as rice cereal, flour products, and more, leading to more and better value-added markets for California rice growers. As a result of this project, 500 local and regional rice growers will benefit from access to unique value-added processing capacity.

Jessie Lord Bakery

Jessie Lord Bakery Increases Cold Storage and Pie Production Capacity

Jessie Lord Bakery, LLC (JLB) will establish an agreement with the California Department of Food and Agriculture to increase production capacity, worker safety, and storage capacity at its frozen pie manufacturing facility in Los Angeles County. Key components of this project include infrastructure improvements, equipment upgrades, and enhanced storage systems, aligning with JLB's dedication to quality, safety, and market expansion. Through these investments, JLB will be able to enhance food and employee safety, expand baking capacity, minimize energy consumption and environmental impact, and increase processing capacities. Additionally, increased production will lead to larger volumes of eligible products including fruit fillings, sugar, dairy ingredients, and other locally and regionally sourced ingredients being purchased.

North Coast Growers Association

Equipment and Supplies for North Coast Growers Association to Create a North Coast Regional Food System Network

The North Coast Growers Association, in partnership with the Del Norte & Tribal Lands Community Food Council, will establish an agreement with the California Department of Food and Agriculture to purchase equipment and supplies to create a local food distribution system across northern California. This project will include purchasing delivery vans to increase distribution; acquiring cold storage nodes to efficiently collect, store, and distribute produce; and purchasing kitchen and processing equipment to add value to farm products, sourcing produce from local and regional producers. As a result of this project, three new jobs will be created, 12 employees will be trained, 100

local/regional producers will benefit, 12 new local/regional products will be processed, 20 new value-added products will be developed, and 14 new market outlets will be established.

Pacific Coast Producers

Improving Peach Pitting Processes and Increasing Competitiveness for Co-op Producers

As a major processor for California peaches, Pacific Coast Producers (PCP) will establish an agreement with the California Department of Food and Agriculture to purchase new peach pitting machines with more robust technology for the Lodi plant and train employees. PCP seeks to improve middle-of-the-supply chain infrastructure to meet industry demands, increase competitiveness in global markets, and create opportunity for industry growth. This new technology will increase processing capacity and quality, therefore increasing demand for locally grown peaches while supporting the middle-of-the supply chain. This project will also address the leading customer complaint - remaining peach pit fragments - and create savings for PCP, and ultimately, producers. The beneficiaries of this project include the 100 peach producers of PCP's 165 total co-op producer members, including those located in at-risk and distressed communities.

Sunsweet Growers, Inc.

Expanding Needed Middle-of-the-Supply-Chain Processing Capacity for California Grown Prunes

Sunsweet Growers, Inc. (Sunsweet) will enter into an agreement with the California Department of Food and Agriculture to install a new highly efficient prune processing line at its existing Yuba City processing facility. Sunsweet is a grower cooperative of 170 prune grower-owners and an essential middle-of-the-supply-chain processor of California prunes. This new infrastructure will benefit Sunsweet's prune grower-owners, most of whom are from distressed communities, by increasing access to value-added processing of their California prunes. This project will also train 14 processing line personnel on safe equipment use. This project will build middle-of-the-supply-chain resilience, leading to more and better value-added California prune markets. The California Prune Board, the Agricultural Council of California, and the California Dried Fruit Coalition affirm this project's deep importance to the supply chain.



SunTerra Produce

Expanding Capacity to Aggregate, Pack, and Distribute Fresh California Produce to Communities in Need

SunTerra Produce will establish an agreement with the California Department of Food and Agriculture to purchase a repacking and packing production line for its facility in Imperial County. SunTerra Produce, a minority-owned grower, aggregator, packer, and shipper, supports small producers needing reliable middle-of-the-supply-chain infrastructure. This project builds on a Project Food Box initiative by investing in equipment that will expand its capacity to source, package, and distribute fresh fruits and vegetables including leafy greens, melons, berries, squashes, onions, carrots, and broccoli directly from California farmers to food banks, faith-based organizations, and health networks. This project includes purchasing, installing, and commissioning new equipment and training personnel on its use, ultimately benefiting 500 local and regional produce farmers.

Ventura Pacific Company

Increasing the Processing Capacity of the California Lemon Industry to Meet Rising Consumer Demand

Ventura Pacific Company, located in Oxnard, will establish an agreement with the California Department of Food and Agriculture to purchase and install an incremental fresh lemon processing line that will expand the grower-owned organization's packing capacity. This project will install one new processing line that will benefit Ventura Pacific Company's 122 local and regional grower-owners, including historically underserved producers in at risk and distressed communities. Ventura Pacific Company will purchase, receive, and install the needed equipment; train processing line staff on equipment use; commission the equipment into production; and track, measure, and report performance in order to achieve desired success metrics. This equipment will increase Ventura Pacific Company's ability to deliver local California produce to more and better markets.
