


CDFA's Border Protection Stations


Primary Function:

Prevent the entry of exotic pest species by:

- Inspecting vehicles and commodities
- Notifying Agricultural Commissioners of incoming shipments requiring additional inspection
- Educating public



Program has operated

Today:

- 16 Stations
- Operating 24/7
- 320 inspectors



New Truckee Facility





In 2010:

- 34.4 million vehicles inspected (27.3 million private vehicles and 7.1 million trucks).
- 70,753 lots of plant material rejected.
- 5,728 actionable pest finds.

Funding: 2011/2012

General Fund: \$9,505,000

Motor Vehicle Fund: \$6,612,000

Harbors & Watercraft Fund: \$2,626,000

Board of Equalization: \$890,000

Cooperative Partnerships

USDA/CBP

Federal domestic quarantine enforcement

- ACP/HLB
- Gypsy Moth
- Mexican Fruit Fly
- 2010: Rejections in violation of Fed. Domestic Quarantines
- Verification of pest freedom for foreign shipments



USFS/CDF

Inspect incoming shipments of firewood for wood boring pests

Finds of non-native species in 2010:

- Longhorned beetles: 155
- Metallic wood-boring beetles: 61
- Others: 11




Actionable Wood-Boring Pest Finds at Border Stations by Year

In 2010:


- 169,660 boat inspections
- 220 adult mussel finds
- 6,899 water drained

Other Activities

Board of Equalization

- Use Tax Data Collection
- Projected to Collect more than \$30 million in tax revenue each year.
